#### Helpful Hints

There is one precaution that every antique car owner should take when a car is going to sit in dead storage, such as over the winter months. That is depress the clutch pedal and hold it in the down position by a piece of wood of suitable length.

This precaution will guarantee that when you are again ready to use your car, you won't be confronted with a clutch that has seized and will not release.

Should you fail to heed this advice and find yourself with a car suffering from a bad case of "Seized Clutchitis", try this before you resort to major surgery:

Leave the transmission in gear, depress the clutch pedal, step on the starter (ignition turned OFF if you value anything parked in front of your car), say a silent prayer, and hope that the starter will break it loose. If it won't, you might do well to hold the clutch pedal in the down position, as described above, and try the starter cure a few days later.

If the starter cure doesn't remedy the seizure, stronger medicine is in order. Try a gentle push or pull from another vehicle - again with the transmission of the troubled car in gear and the clutch pedal depressed. Don't forget to keep

the ignition switch turned off.

If the above prescribed mild medicine doesn't cure it, you will have to resort to disassembly.
